

Agreeing with him, Maya Unnikrishnan from Lund-beck India Pvt Ltd, explains: "Most patients who suffer from mental disorders keep emotions like stress, anger, love, and anxiety, bottled up. Art is a way of expression for them."

Though the paintings displayed at the exhibition were not on sale, "we are planning to organise ones where the art work is for sale too. This is a preview into bigger things that are in store for the future", says Lata Jacob, clinical manager, Medico Pastoral Association.
